About Us

Pride Foundation Australia supports charitable activities that benefit LGBTQIA+ people and allied communities in Australia by advancing equity for the most disadvantaged LGBTQIA+ Australians and overcoming discrimination.

WHO WE ARE

Pride Foundation Australia (PFA) is a national philanthropic foundation run by and for the LGBTIQA+ community in Australia. We have an all-volunteer board, advisory committees, and working groups from around Australia. We began our work in 2004 and aim to sustain our purpose, growth and giving over many decades to come.

WHAT WE DO

The Foundation actively works to increase philanthropic support for the Australian LGBTQIA+ and allied communities through fundraising, grant giving, collaboration and commissioning projects.

- We are accountable, transparent and responsive in our fundraising and grant-making. We are allies to social justice movements by contributing our monetary resources, time, knowledge, skills and access to power.

OUR FUNDING PRINCIPLES

- We empower people with lived experience to advocate for themselves.
- We are instigators, enablers and catalysts for change.
- We collaborate rather than doing all projects ourselves, we fund projects and enable expertise and networks to do the work and enhance their capability.
- Our methods include creative endeavours, research, education and training, and community development.
- We do not fund a task that should be part of an organisation's core roles.
- We focus on an area until it is recognised as important by other organisations and government.

OUR FINANCIAL STATUS

Pride Foundation Australia (PFA) is a company limited by guarantee. We are regulated by the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC), to which we report annually. The Australian Taxation Office has endorsed PFA as a charity with income tax exemption (ITE) and deductible gift recipient status (DGR1), meaning gifts to Pride Foundation Australia (ABN: 85 116 997 427) are income-tax-deductible.

Chairperson's Report

Dr. Ruth McNair AM, Chair of Pride Foundation Australia

We are very pleased to showcase our busy and productive year in our third annual report. Pride Foundation Australia continues to grow exponentially, both in our scope of work and our reach across Australia.

We are indebted to our almost 500 donors and many businesses that support us, from fundraisers at local schools to a large bequest, every cent is crucial. We also have a range of partners.

First, a huge acknowledgement of our 10 year partnership with the Sidney Myer Fund, which has now finished. Together we co-funded 18 large grants to a total of \$320,000. The projects addressed issues facing LGBTQIA+ Australians living with disability, healthy ageing for LGBTQIA+ Australians, and LGBTQIA+ refugees and people seeking asylum in Australia. This was our first major philanthropic collaboration and it helped us to build our impact through co-funding as well as improving our connections and brand recognition around Australia. Thanks to Kirsty Allen at Myer who sat on every one of the grant selection panels and was wonderful to work with.

This year we have developed a new partnership with the Australian Communities Foundation, who are supporting our grant making through

the work of Charlene Yum. Thanks to Charlene for her expertise and attention to detail since the beginning of 2023. We ran five large grant rounds and three small grant rounds this financial year and gave almost \$250,000 in grants, our largest total in one year by far. We worked with expert partners in each of our focus areas for granting - thanks to Renee Dixson at Forcibly Displaced People Network (refugee and asylum seekers area), Aldo Spina, LGBTIQ Health Australia and Ash Martin at Endeavour (alcohol and drug area), Liam Leonard (rural area), Erin Taylor at Australian Plays Transformed (arts area), and Sam Turner and colleagues at the Aurora Fund.

The Board is undergoing a period of renewal. We had our in-person strategic planning weekend in December 2022, wonderfully facilitated by Cath Smith, a former board member and now expert consultant. We finessed our vision and goals and planned our focus areas for the next 3-5 years. We are continuing with our major focus on LGBTIQA+ refugees, alcohol and drug issues, and the arts; and starting to explore involvement in First Nations activities. Bec Johnson supported us during the year to start developing our First Nations engagement strategy and co-wrote our statement of support for Aboriginal Australians on our website. We are currently looking for new First Nations



board members to lead this work. We sadly farewelled two stalwarts of the board, Colin Krycer and Ian Gould, who retired this year. But we welcomed two new members, Mollie Hewitt from Western Australia and Ayan Dasvarma from Victoria. Cal Andrews (Victoria) will also be joining us in 2024.

We held a number of events including fundraisers in Sydney, Brisbane and Hobart, and had involvement in Sydney World Pride and Castlemaine Pride. Thanks to our Patron Dennis Altman for attending all of our fundraisers and championing our work as always.

Thanks to all of our supporters and collaborators for working with us to advance equity for Australian LGBTQIA+ communities and individuals.


MPACT REPORT 2022-23

Donations in 2022-23

We are again immensely grateful to our individual donors who provided more than half of our income. We are particularly thankful to Else Harting who made a large donation as a living bequest in memory of her son.

Business donations are growing year on year, thanks to many fund-raisers and champions within businesses selecting PFA as their recipient.

Compared with the 2022 year, we had a smaller overall proportion of individual donations (17%, compared with 35% in 2022), and a smaller proportion from business donations (41% compared with 63% in 2022), due to the single large bequest making up 35% of revenue. Philanthropic grants were at the same proportion and we did not apply for any government grants this financial year.






Spending in 2021–23

BUILDING THE RAINBOW CONNECTION

We again increased our spending on grants to a total of \$244,223 (compared with \$132,036 last year), comprising 74% of all expenditure. Our largest granting area remains LGBTIQA+ refugees and asylum seekers. There were a wide range of activities in this area including two large grant rounds, one grant to the Forcibly Displaced People Network to establish a national coalition, two recurrent grants to peer support groups (in SA and Qld), seed funding to the Tasmanian Refugee Legal Service, and several grants to individual refugees to support their settlement costs. We also sponsored refugee attendance at the Queer Displacements conference

in Sydney during World Pride in March 2023. We diversified our areas of grant giving, adding the alcohol and drug area, thanks to the Endeavour funding received in the previous year. This included a large grant round funding five organisations, disability grant with the Aurora Fund, five grants to rural areas affected by natural disasters, and two arts and culture grants, including sponsoring the Dan Daw show during World Pride. Finally, we ran three small grant rounds, funding 37 grants around Australia, the majority in regional locations.




Analysis of our expenditure over our lifetime shows that we have increased our operational spending as our income has increased. However, operating costs remain low at 26%, this includes paying our marketing officer, and adding payment for our new grants administration officer at the Australian Communities Foundation.

Our Donors

The number of donors and value of donations has again significantly increased. This financial year PFA received \$407,344.00 in donations.

In the 2022-23 financial year 478 individual people donated to PFA, compared to 405 donors the year before. The majority of donors (86%) give once, while 65 people gave more than once during the year. Our major bequest this year was for \$250,000. Our donors come from all over Australia, and the proportion from NSW and WA has increased this year.

Our Impact: Large Grants

AREA: LGBTQIA+ REFUGEES AND PEOPLE SEEKING ASYLUM

We had our final two large grant rounds with the Sidney Myer Fund, both of which were focused on LGBTIQA+ refugee and asylum seekers. PFA and the Sidney Myer Fund each contribute \$10,000 to each round. The first round attracted eight initial applications and the second round had 16 applications.



The first round December 2022 funded \$20,000 to the Asylum Seeker Centre, NSW. The ASC project was to establish a new framework, manage meaningful activities and gather data to improve the existing LGBTIQA+ Support Group for People seeing asylum, a peer-led initiative.



The second round in June 2023 funded \$20,000 to the Australia and New Zealand Tongzhi Rainbow Alliance (ANTRA), a national organisation. ANTRA is a national group of LGBTIA+ people with Chinese backgrounds. Their project is to establish a peer support network for forcibly displaced Chinese speaking queers in Australia.

AREA: LGBTQIA+ REFUGEES AND PEOPLE SEEKING ASYLUM

We provided two grants of \$5,000 each to peer-led support groups for LGBTIQA+ refugees and people seeking asylum:



A second grant to Brisbane-based Third Queer Culture auspiced by Queensland Program of Assistance to Survivors of Torture and Trauma.



A second grant to an Adelaide group Sparkling Productions to continue establishing their support group.



PFA continued to work with Community Refugee Integration and Settlement Pilot (CRISP) to develop LGBTIQA+ specific community sponsorship. We provided funding from our LGBTIQ refugee sponsorship sub-fund to five LGBTIQA+ refugees living in Melbourne for various settlement costs and emergency funds.



We also seed-funded \$20,000 to the Tasmanian Refugee Legal Service to build their capacity to support LGBTIQA+ asylum seekers. This will include legal needs mapping, developing resources, delivering community legal education, establishing referral pathways, and then starting to deliver legal casework services to LGBTIQA+ individuals applying for protection visas based on sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression and/or sex characteristics.







Finally, we continued our partnership with Forcibly Displaced People Network (FDPN). We received a grant from Maddocks Foundation in 2022, which enabled the establishment of a new national LGBTIQ refugee coalition, led by FDPN. We also sponsored attendance at the FDPN Queer Displacements conference held during World Pride in Sydney in February 2023.

AREA: LGBTIQA+ ALCOHOL AND DRUG ISSUES

We commenced our spending in the new area of safe use of alcohol and other drugs (AOD) in two ways.

First, we ran a national grant round and from 21 applications we funded five organisations to a total of \$54,400. Many thanks to our selection panel members of Sarina Jackson (PFA), Ruth McNair (PFA), Liv Hogarth (PFA), Aldo Spina (LHA) and Ash Martin (Endeavour).

Second, we commissioned LGBTIQA Health Australia to run a national consultation on the key LGBTIQA+ alcohol and drug issues and develop priorities for funding. Aldo Spina ran this consultation and worked with us extensively to guide our next steps. The PFA board decided to focus LGBTIQA+ targeted health promotion to improve safe AOD use in our community. We are now developing a partnership with a peak LGBTIQA+ health organisation to run this project.



Odyssey House Victoria received \$10,000 to promote and enhance clinical practice around intersectionality of Aboriginal and LGBTIQ identity.



Network of Alcohol and Other Drug Agencies; The Matilda Centre for Research in Mental Health and Substance Use, University of Sydney received \$11,900 for Understanding and improving trans youth experiences seeking, accessing and engaging AOD services.



Sexual Health Quarters (SHQ), with Western Australian Network of Alcohol and other Drug Agencies and Palmerston Association in WA received \$12,500 for the RISE (Responsive, Inclusive, Safe, Education) Project.



Northern Territory AIDS and Hepatitis Council (Alice Springs NT) received \$15,000 for Sexual and Gender Diversity Training for AOD staff.



Australia & New Zealand Tongzhi Rainbow Alliance Inc., a national project, received \$5,000 to demystify AOD for the Queer Chinese in Australia Communities.



AREA: LGBTQIA+ DISASTER SUPPORT - RURAL & REGIONAL

This was a one-off grant round to support LGBTIQA+ organisations that had been impacted by several natural disasters over the previous two years, including fires in Victoria, and floods in New South Wales, Queensland and South Australia.

We funded a total of \$28,500 for six projects from 14 applications. Many thanks to Liam Leonard for being our external member on the selection panel.

AREA: LGBTQIA+ ARTS AND CULTURE

We funded our second grant in partnership with Australian Plays Transform this year.

This was \$6,000 for The Pride Collection 2023, which will be a curated catalogue of the best of Australian playwriting that celebrates diversity on the Australian Stage. The collection will celebrate playwrights, characters, and themes of the LGBTQIA+ community curated by a panel of leading theatre industry figures and educators.



We also provided sponsorship for the Dan Daw Show at Sydney World Pride. This was to re-rehearse, produce, present and perform The Dan Daw Show as part of Sydney WorldPride at the Seymour Centre 21-24 February (\$10,000). It also supported the accommodation costs of the touring party (\$5,000).

AREA: LGBTQIA+ PEOPLE LIVING WITH DISABILITY

We chose to focus on disability and mental health for our shared grant round this year with the Aurora Fund. There were 10 applications and we were very pleased to fund \$20,000 to Inclusive Rainbow Voices. This is now the peak LGBTIQA+ disability organisation in Victoria, and the grant will enable them to engage with their key constituents to develop a strategic directions plan.

Our season at Sydney WorldPride was full of joy, tears and power.
